

Unsafe Disposal of **Electrical Items Causes Fires**

Vapes, electrical items and batteries are extremely flammable and cause fires when crushed inside collection vehicles. This puts our crews, staff at our processing facilities and the public at risk of burns, chemical exposure and smoke inhalation - injuries that can be life-changing.

We have launched a campaign to highlight items that cause fires when disposed of incorrectly.

PLEASE REMEMBER:

- **Used vapes** should be taken back to retailers, and **never** placed in household recycling and rubbish bins or on-street litter bins.
- Electrical items with batteries (including hidden batteries), plugs or cables can be recycled, **but** they must be taken to dedicated recycling points. You can find your local recycling point at **recycleyourelectricals.org.uk**
- **Batteries** can be taken to your local library and supermarkets to be recycled.

Let's tackle fly-tipping together

Bromley Council and Veolia are working together, with the support of our Street Friends, to keep the borough clean. Furniture, fridges, mattresses and other household items dumped on streets and alleyways in the borough are fly-tips. This is illegal and we have to stop it together.

Flatten cardboard boxes

Please remove any polystyrene before flattening large cardboard boxes and placing them in your recycling box. This makes it easier for crews to collect.

Tips for a zero food waste Christmas

Buy loose

Choose loose fruit and vegetables instead of pre-packaged options. This allows you to buy exactly what you need, as well as cut down on plastic packaging.

Make a list

Before you go shopping, write a list, take it with you and stick to it. Avoid impulse buys and only purchase what you know you will use.

'Use By' or 'Best Before' dates

"Use By" is about safety. Do not use food after its use by date. "Best Before" is about quality. You can still eat the product after its best before date.

Make your meal go further

Use your leftovers to create new meals. Leftover vegetables can become a tasty vegetable soup, and leftover turkey can go into sandwiches and curries. Freezing leftovers can also extend their life.

Waldo Road Reuse and Recycling Centre 2025 upgrades and closure

Due to major infrastructure upgrades, the Waldo Road Reuse and Recycling Centre will be temporarily closed. Works will get underway early in 2025, with the Waldo Road Reuse and Recycling Centre closed from Sunday 2 February, with the site then expected to reopen in 2026.

While Waldo Road Reuse and Recycling Centre is closed, residents can still:

- Visit Churchfields Road Reuse and Recycling Centre. A booking system will be introduced to manage demand.


Recycling Heroes

The Council's £1million Platinum Jubilee Parks Fund

Farnborough New Inn Recreation Ground

Farnborough Village Society received £20,000 for playground and biodiversity improvements, including a springer, wooden trim trail with lily pads and wobbly bridge. The Society plans to plant honeysuckle to attract butterflies and will also introduce bat boxes.



Cudham **Recreation Ground**

The Friends Group received £20,000 towards playground improvements. Further fundraising resulted in a new accessible cradle swing, an exciting climbing frame and a challenging wooden trim trail.

McAndrews Recreation Ground

Parents formed a Playground Group and were awarded £17,000. Further community funds raised and from West Wickham Residents' Association resulted in a four-way rocker, a fire engine and thermoplastic markings. A fence was removed joining two playgrounds to improve flow and accessibility.



Queensmead **Recreation Ground**

The Playground Regeneration Group's £20,000 award with further fundraising financed a new climbing frame and an accessible train with ticket office. An accessible picnic bench and more seating were paid for by Clarion Futures.



Whitehall **Recreation Ground**

The Friends of Whitehall Recreation Ground applied for £20.000 and combined with their own funds have improved the playground area with a wooden trim trail and log swing. A new basketball goal was also installed.

Hoblingwell Wood Recreation Ground

Active Communities were awarded £15,000 to refurbish the pavilion, including new showers, sinks, toilets and changing room space for younger and older football teams.

Bromley Council has fought for many years for a fairer funding settlement for residents and we are fast approaching crisis point

ave you ever thought how Council services are funded? Yes, of course, your Council Tax goes towards paying for services that we all depend on, but Council Tax itself is only part of the story. Much of the remainder of our budget comes from Central Government funding.

Bromley's ongoing campaign for the reform of the current financial system now spans a quarter of a century, a campaign that must be won because the allocation criteria remain flawed for three main reasons.

Firstly, because it has always disproportionately funded Inner London at Outer London's expense. Secondly, because the system was further tweaked in 2003/04 to make that bias against Outer London even worse.

Thirdly, because successive Governments since that time have continued to duck the difficult question of Local Government Funding reform.


As a result, we are witnessing Boroughs across the Outer London belt, increasingly struggle to balance their books and a number are set to fail completely because the disparity in funding between Inner and Outer London has now become unmanageable.

If Bromley were to get an average share of London's funding it would provide us with an additional £53.7 million each year and the problem would disappear."

"As you can see from the chart below and the graph above, the cumulative loss to Bromley over the years has topped in excess of \pounds 1.3 billion even using today's lower figure for illustrative purposes.

Amazingly, despite all of these challenges, Bromley Council has thrived hitherto by becoming the most cost-efficient Council in London and by bearing down relentlessly on cost and driving efficiency at every turn. Sadly, even that isn't going to be enough moving forward.

Broken Beyond Repair

There is widespread agreement that the current system of Local Government funding is broken beyond repair and needs to be replaced by a fairer funding model which fundamentally addresses the financial disparity between the 32

"Bromley only remains amongst those best placed to survive the impending financial storm thanks to years of careful planning and marshalling of its reserves. However, even Bromley will struggle to set a balanced budget by 2028 on current projections and the conclusion is inescapable. Urgent change to the current system is essential." London Boroughs. The longstanding problem, ignored by consecutive Governments for far too long, has now reached crisis point, posing serious threats to vital public services set in place to protect our Borough's most vulnerable residents.

Bromley's residents deserve fairer funding

In summary, Bromley's residents have long since deserved far fairer funding and better treatment from Central Government and that remains the simple key message which Bromley Council is continuing to press upon key decision makers."

Exciting new ways of working will enhance the quest for older people in the Borough to live and age well

magine a fiercely independent older person who lives alone, but after a hospital stay everyday living is a little more challenging. An assessment on leaving hospital suggests sensors around their own home would enable close relatives to monitor routines and provide support for a few weeks until they are able to return to living safely on their own.

That's just one way 'assistive technology' can help pave the way for living in one's own home for longer; central to Bromley's aim for residents to live and age well while retaining as much independence as possible.

"Our Adult Social Care is on the threshold of momentous change as we transform how its delivered, employing innovative ways of using new technology to help people enjoy being in their own homes for longer," says Donna Glover, Bromley's new Director of Adult Services.

The Council has teamed up with the Social Care Institute for Excellence (SCIE) to work through the possibilities and practicalities of where a digital approach and assistive technology can take the Council and its partners' services to the next level and benefit the Borough's ageing population.

"We will be exploring ways of using technology to support our staff and make life better and simpler for our residents. Of course, we won't force a digital route where it's not wanted, but our aim is to modernise our social care offer based upon a model of support that encourages independence and allows residents, if they are able, to do things for themselves."

Timeline to the Future

2023 – 'Ageing Well in Bromley' Strategy launched to ensure older people retain independence for as long as possible. 2024 – Bromley launches 10-year Adult Social Care Digital Strategy to make better use of digital technology. Autism

Bromley's Deputy Mayor is a high achiever and an example to others

like the variety," " says Cllr Jonathan Andrews, talking animatedly about his role as Deputy Mayor. "It's great to get out and represent the Borough, and you really do get to see and be part of such a lot of different things. I attended a birthday party recently for a lovely lady of 103, though youthful beyond her years. I could be visiting a nursery where the passion of staff and families alike shines through, or opening an inclusivity festival - sometimes both on the same day! Usually, you'll know when you have to say a few words, but sometimes it's more impromptu."

Everyone is different

Considering the pressures of meeting new people as Deputy Mayor, sitting on many committees (including as a Planning Chairman) and working as a lawyer, it may be surprising to learn Cllr Andrews is on the autistic spectrum, having been diagnosed when a schoolchild in the Borough.

"I was never raised to feel that it should hold me back,"

he asserts. "It gives me focus and determination, and being open about it has helped me and hopefully others in a similar situation. People are aware of stereotypes, but the thing to remember is that everyone is different.

Personally, I very much enjoy talking to people and hearing their stories – and you certainly

get to meet a lot of interesting people, doing great work across the Borough, in this role".

The Deputy Mayor believes perceptions have changed over the years. "It's partly generational," he says. "As identification of autism improved over the nineties and noughties the number of diagnoses increased, and as those individuals - me included – have reached adulthood, this has brought more visibility and awareness to workplaces. I work in law, for example, and there is a lot more visibility now than 10 years ago when I first looked into being a lawyer.

All-Age Autism Board

"Becoming the Councillor for Darwin Ward made perfect sense as I love the area. It's where my grandparents have lived for over 50 years, and I've grown up with its beautiful green fields and woodland (and even wild deer) on my doorstep - it's vitally important that we support and preserve that." Also, as Chairman of the All-Age Autism Board, Cllr Andrews has collaborated on autism understanding and acceptance and brings his own insight and experiences to the Board.

"I'd urge others with autism not to be afraid or ashamed of your special interests

 indeed, you may be able to harness these and perhaps even make a living out of them in the right circumstances", advises
 Cllr Andrews.

"Employment rates for those with autism are unfortunately low across the country,

but with the right mindset, support and understanding, there's a way forward. It's about encouraging people to have the confidence to pursue their interests, and encouraging employers to see the very real benefits of hiring motivated and focused people who think differently."

Singled out for praise

Cllr Jonathan Andrews has been shortlisted for Innovator of the Year in the Local Government Information Unit and asset manager CCLA's awards for 2024.



The nomination is for going 'above and beyond' for residents and for his 'trailblazing work on autism inclusion and passion for improving educational opportunities for young people'.

Sensory Differences

The proximity of others and movement especially in crowded places for a person with autism can be overwhelming, as can new places and social situations generally. Learning styles may be different and planning and dealing with unpredictability and changes to routine may be more challenging as well as responding to social cues.

Boosted by Start Up Bromley

A Bromley resident's dream came true when his new products hit supermarkets across the country

ocal Entrepreneur Adam Womersley developed his beloved brand, Potina, from a keen desire to find better drinks for children.

"As a father of two, I could see there were plant-based products available but none for children," said Adam. His two plant-based, high fibre milk substitute drinks contain no artificial additives or added sugar and are now available in 400 Tesco stores.

Adam was supported at every stage of the three year development period by Better's Business Start Up team at Bromley Central Library.

"Now I tell people that the library is not just the place where you borrow books," said Adam.

"We've got these amazing business resources on our doorstep but not everyone knows about them." There's plenty on offer at the Library such as the business lounge where Adam hosted meetings and conference calls. He also won the 'Start-Up Pitch' competition, receiving a much-needed £2,000 prize.

"I found their workshops on how to raise investment and PR and social media really useful."

"A session on how to condense a complex business plan onto a single

sheet was particularly helpful in focussing the mind."

I've been greatly helped by the Start Up team's mentoring sessions each quarter. Watch this space, there's more to come!" he added.
